Administer first aid to a casualty who is suffering from shock.

Provide treatment for minor injuries including small cuts, grazes, bruises, minor burns, scalds and small splinters.

Circulation problems

Wounds and bleeding

Burns and scalds

Injuries to bones, muscles and joints
